Times Tables:

At the end of last term, your child brought home their times table challenge booklet. Please continue to support your child in learning their times tables at home, this is a vital part of their learning as it provides a foundation for learning in other areas of mathematics.

Bronze, silver and gold awards (with beautiful glittery star brooches) are available for the children to earn when they have completed each of the challenges in their booklet.

Times tables are best secured through rote learning; practising them little and often.

Please remember to practise the times tables in the order of the booklet and do not move on until each times table is secure. There is a useful instruction page on the inside of your child's booklet.

PE lessons take place on a <u>Tuesday morning</u>. Children will need to continue attending school <u>wearing a PE kit</u> <u>on this day (including a waterproof coat)</u>. They should not be wearing trainers on other days.


Reading Journals

In English lessons, year 4 are studying 'The Girl who stole an Elephant' by Nizrana Farook.



As this fearless schoolgirl endeavours to help others, she is forced into a jungle, with her two companions, facing danger and dilemmas — but is ably assisted by the elephant she stole. As the story unfolds, the reader is able to recognise Chaya's strength of character, loyalty, compassion and ingenuity.

The children are enjoying reading this book as it is full of suspense and rich description. They have produced some writing in role to explore and develop empathy for the characters.






